

Palm Sunday



Holy Week begins today with Palm Sunday! Jesus weeps over the city and then rides into it. He weeps because he knows that the city is, so many ways, sunk in sin and is stubbornly refusing all the graces that he is offering. Oh, the mystery of iniquity! It will suffer horribly for this. Knowing all this, Jesus doesn't walk away from the city and its inhabitants, but rides into the city on the donkey, an animal that signifies peace, knowing full well what is going to happen. God is faithful; all too often we are not!

Holy Thursday – Jesus will institute two magnificent sacraments; the Mass (the Holy Eucharist) and the Priesthood wherein the Eucharist will become present to us. The Mass starts at 7:00pm followed by the Transference of the Blessed Sacrament to the Altar of Repose till 11:00pm. This "Transference" commemorates Jesus's journey to the Mount of Olives where after much prayer he allows himself to be captured. If you can, stay with Jesus till 11:00pm.

There will be confessions beginning after Mass until they are completed. This Liturgy is so beautiful. You can almost "feel" Jesus at the Last Supper and in Gethsemane.

Good Friday – we pray the Stations of the Cross at 11:00am followed by the beginning of the Divine Mercy Novena. This is a beautiful devotion and one that every Catholic should cultivate and pray periodically. Jesus walked the first Way of the Cross; Jesus only asks us to meditate on his wall in such a safe environment as a Church, then to incorporate its saving graces into our own lives. This will help us be faithful to him.

The Commemoration of the Lord's Passion and Death begins at 3:00pm. There is no Mass any-

where in the Church on this day. As this day is a penitential day the Church has made it a **mandatory day of fast and abstinence for all Catholics**. Remember this, write a note on your fridge. For Jesus, the Church should be packed!

Holy Saturday – the Easter Vigil begins this year at 9:00pm. This year's Easter Vigil has a special significance for Corpus Christi because it will show forth the first fruits of our 10 Year Vision. All adults to receive the Sacraments of Initiation have gone through Alpha, Faith Studies (Level 1) and RCIA. This is our discipleship pathway. We are now accompanying people to the full riches of the Catholic Faith and into our 10 Year Vision.

This is THE liturgy of the year. I strongly encourage you to attend the Vigil, especially if you have not done so before. It is divided into 4 parts: Liturgy of Light, of Word, of Baptism and of Eucharist. If you do attend Mass this night, it satisfies for the Sunday obligation, meaning that you do not have to return to Mass on Sunday.

This is the most sacred week of all time. It is important to prepare yourself and get ready to accompany Jesus as he offers himself for you. Read and pray the Gospel accounts that focus on the Passion of Jesus!

Let us continue to pray for each other as we travel through Holy Week!

pastor's Corner

聖枝主日 本堂神父的話



聖週今天以聖枝主日開始!耶穌為城市 哭泣,然後騎驢入城中。祂哭泣是因為祂知 道,這個城市在許多方面深陷罪惡中,頑固 地拒絕了祂所提供的所有恩寵。哦,罪惡的 奧秘!它將因此受到可怕的折磨。耶穌知道 這一切,卻不會離開這個城市及其居民,而 是騎著驢子進入這座城市,這是一種象徵和 平的動物,祂完全知道接下來會發生什麼。 天主是信實的;我們卻常常不是!

聖週四 - 耶穌將建立兩個壯麗的聖事: 彌撒(聖體)和神父職位,在其中聖體將成 為我們的禮物。彌撒將於晚上七點開始,隨 後將祝聖聖體轉移到臨時祭台,直至晚上十 一點。這個『轉移』紀念了耶穌前往橄欖山 的旅程,在那裡祂經過了許多祈禱後,允許 自己被捕。如果可以的話,請與耶穌待在一 起,直到晚上十一點。

彌撒後開始修和聖事,直到全部完成為 止。這個禮儀是如此美麗。你幾乎可以『感 受到』耶穌在最後的晚餐和橄欖園。

耶穌受難日-我們將在上午11點有苦路善工,隨後開始神聖慈悲九日敬禮。這是一個美麗的善工,每位天主教徒都應該培養並定期參與。耶穌走過了第一條十字架苦路;耶穌只要求我們在教堂這樣安全的環境中默想祂的苦路,然後將其拯救的恩寵融入我們自己的生活中。這將幫助我們忠信於祂。

主受難和死亡的紀念活動將於下午 3:00 開始。在這一天,教堂中不會舉行彌撒。由 於這一天是懺悔的日子,教會規定所有天主教徒必須守大小齋。請記住這一點,在你的 冰箱上寫下一個便條。對於耶穌而言,教堂 應該擠滿人群!

聖週六 - 今年的復活節守夜祈禱在晚上 9:00 開始。今年的復活節守夜對基督聖體聖血 堂區的意義特別重要,因為它將展示我們十 年願景的首批成果。所有要接受入門聖事的 成年人都已經參與過啟發法課程、信仰研究 (第一級)和成人信仰入門課程。這是我們 的門徒培訓路徑。我們現在正在陪伴人們走 向天主教信仰以及我們的十年願景豐盛之 處。

這是一年中的重要禮儀。我強烈鼓勵你 參加守夜彌撒,尤其是如果你以前沒有參加 過的話。這次守夜彌撒分為四個部分:光之 禮儀,話語之禮儀,洗禮之禮儀和聖體之禮 儀。如果您參加了這次彌撒,它就滿足了主 日的義務,這意味著您不必在星期日返回彌 撒。

這是所有時間中最神聖的一星期。準備 自己,準備好陪伴耶穌,因為他為你奉獻自 己。閱讀並祈禱關於耶穌受難的福音記述! 讓我們在渡過聖週的旅程中繼續彼此代禱!

Parish Mission Reflection Miguel Lacson

The parish mission with Fr. Wade Menezes was a grace filled week, providing a deep dive at the beautiful faith that we sometimes forget holds a rich tradition and history. From the saints that came before us, to the wonderful gift of the Sacraments, Christ has provided many paths for us to grow closer in relationship with Him. Of all the takeaways, I will never forget that when we recite the words, "And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us", the direct Greek translation of 'dwelt' makes it so that we actually mean, "And the Word became flesh and pitched His tent among us". The image of Christ pitching His tent is one that I believe is a desire of His to know our hearts and to meet each of us where we are in our current state of life. Give Him the space, He'll bring the tent.

Fr. Wade did a wonderful job leading this year's parish mission! I found the sessions that I was able to attend spiritually nourishing, and the best kind - just enough so that it leaves you wanting to learn more. This has been a blessing and a grace, because it has strengthened my faith in the sacraments, especially for the Eucharist. I found it profound when he explained how our senses fail

when receiving communion, other than hearing - demanding our faith.

One more takeaway I had was in regards to reverence with the Eucharist. He explained how God was the only one worth our *Latria*, or worship/adoration. Everything/ everyone else we revere is only due veneration, or some form of *Dulia*. That it is all about God, something I overlook at times. That adoration for the Eucharist isn't just something I give to God, but something that God is due and deserves. And how we conduct ourselves around Him and when receiving Him should reflect that, even when He look, feel, smell, and taste like a piece of bread.

4 Steps To A Simple St. Joseph Altar



- 1.Find a table you can dedicate to the purpose of a St. Joseph Altar and cloth it with an off-white, brown, or beige tablecloth.

- 4. Finally, arrange the food. Most often breads are homemade and in the shapes of crosses and hearts, but do what you can. Be sure to add bread, pasta, fruit, and even wine. Avoid meat, eggs, and dairy.

Almsgiving benefits the soul!

Let's look at this third pillar of Lent and a major call in our lives as Catholics.

What is Almsgiving?

The root of the word "alms" comes from ancient Latin and Greek words meaning "mercy". The root of the word "charity" comes from the Latin word for love, which is *caritas*.

According to the *Catechism of the Catholic Church,* "Giving alms to the poor is a witness to fraternal charity: it is also a work of justice pleasing to God." (2462)

The <u>USCCB explains</u>, "The foundational call of Christians to charity is a frequent theme of the Gospels. During Lent, we are asked to focus more intently on 'almsgiving,' which means donating money or goods to the poor and performing other acts of charity."

Almsgiving helps us practice detachment from earthly things. It is not limited to the giving of material possessions; instead, it is the gift of oneself to another.

Here are some examples of almsgiving:
Donate money to your favorite charity.
Give your time to a food bank or soup kitchen.
Give your time, talent, or treasure to a local pregnancy center.

Offer free babysitting or help members of your community.

Be fully present with your family, friends, or children.

Perform spiritual or temporal works of mercy. The practice of almsgiving is rooted in scripture (in both the Old and New Testaments):

"Water extinguishes a blazing fire: so almsgiving atones for sin." (Sir. 3:30)

"Whoever cares for the poor lends to the Lord, who will pay back the sum in full." (Prov. 19:17)

"A man who is righteous will be remembered forever" (Ps. 112:5-9)

"Give to those who ask, and do not turn your back on anyone who wants to borrow" (Matt. 5:42)


"Almsgiving delivers from death, and it will purge away every sin." (Tob. 12:9)

"If you satisfy the afflicted, your light shall rise in the darkness" (Isa. 58:10)

"Sell all that you have and distribute it to the poor, and you will have a treasure in heaven" (Lk. 18:22)

"If someone who has worldly means sees a brother in need and refuses him compassion, the love of God cannot remain in him" (1 Jn. 3:17)

Here's what the saints said about giving alms:





— Saint Francis of Assisi



When considering how to incorporate almsgiving into Lent, ask yourself these three questions:


- 1) How can I use my time to serve others this Lent?
